Last year, in memory of our dear friend Ross, we launched The Ross Moncrieff Scholarship Fund. Ross was a beloved Core Member of L'Arche Hamilton who passed away unexpectedly in 2020. Ross loved to dream big and was an incredibly gifted artist. Funded through an endowment, this grant provides a scholarship annually to a Core Member who needs financial support to fulfill a dream (like taking a course, buying materials or going on a trip).

The 2022-23 Ross Moncrieff Memorial scholarship was granted to Michael Mattice, who wanted to use the funds to help explore educational opportunities, and we're happy to share that after taking some skills development courses through the year, Michael was admitted to Mohawk College and will be attending the CICE program full-time starting in September. Way to go, Mike!

I am studying the Social Service Worker program at Mohawk College and was presented with the opportunity to interview with L'Arche Hamilton for my 6-week summer placement. I didn't know anything about the charity but after researching the mission and vision statement I was happy to interview and even happier when I was accepted. As a volunteer I have gone on various outings with L'Arche assistants and Core Members. In the first week alone, I visited both the Inclusion CoffeeHouse and the beach and in my second week we went bowling.

My greatest surprise has been the tenacity that both the staff and Core Members exhibit every day. I was able to realize my greatest challenge on my first day, as all my learning and experience prior to my placement was completely theoretical. On my first day I was in a new environment and overwhelmed with questions in my mind. I was faced with the realization that I didn't know how to help anyone, and I found that very challenging, as I had a high expectation of myself and a deep-rooted ideation of what it meant to help others. I had to learn to challenge that bias if I wanted to be successful in my desire to help the Core Members in a way that honored who they are as individuals while also providing the correct and appropriate amount of support. By far my greatest sense of accomplishment has been the bonds and friendships I have formed with the Core Members as well as the staff. Equally there is that sense of satisfaction with sticking with my placement after day one and reaching out to the incredible staff and volunteers who made me feel so comfortable with any questions I had.





It also made all the difference that they are living examples of how we can all do for ourselves to a degree, and we all need assistance in this lifetime with various tasks. Every day that I am here it feels like a gift filled with endless joy. I have received support from the staff not just about my education and learning but also in my personal life. Once the Core Members start arriving, and then getting to see the way they greet their friends and positively interact with everyone at day program are daily gifts for us all. Personally, I will never forget the first time I was told I was missed after a weekend off. I have gained so much from my time here but one of my favourites has been the practical knowledge and experience because it has created a new possibility of what my future could look like. I would like to thank L'Arche for openly accepting, educating, laughing, and loving not only myself but everyone who walks through those doors, and for being a leading example of all of us as a community. It isn't us versus them it is simply, US as community of support, love, help and care.

9:15am: Time to get all the baked goods out courtesy of Mary and Marilyn, coffee brewed by Mike B. and Wayne, tables set up by Anand and Dave and the cash register going by Jessica.

10am: The gate is open and the Coffeehouse is officially open for business.

10:30am: Sometimes we have musicians, art or other special events happening and everything gets set-up for the morning.

11am: Friends at Adults in Motion visit us.

11:15am: Parents and Tots finish their swim class and come visit.

12pm: Lunch time!

12:30pm: Begin tidying up.

1pm: The gate closes and everyone tidies up. 1:30pm: Back home or to Day Program.

2pm-4pm: Booking musicians and other events for weeks

ahead, advertising, meetings around growth.

Wednesday

9am: Marveen, Mandy, Sandi, Lynda, Amina, Phil and Dave arrive to the Coffeehouse.

9:15am: Time to get all the baked goods out by Marveen and Sandi, coffee brewed by Phil and Dave, tables set up by Sandi and the cash register going by Mandy.

10am: The gate is opened and the Coffeehouse is officially open for business.

10:30am: The L'Arche Day Program visits for a coffee and treats.

Ilam: Members from other groups such as Community Living, Adult Community Services, Christian Horizons and more come to visit.

11:30am: Senior swim finishes up and seniors visits us. 12pm: Members from Woodview helps us sweep the floors and clean the tables.

12pm: Lunch time!

12:30pm: Begin tidying up.

lpm: The gate closes and everyone tidies up. 1:30pm: Back home or to Day Program.

2pm-4pm: Ordering of dry goods, picking up paper

goods, ordering coffee beans.
